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*Après quarante ans d'une vie confortable, Ella n'imaginait pas un jour changer sa destinée. Engagée comme lectrice, elle découvre un manuscrit retraçant la rencontre au XIIe siècle du poète Rûmi avec le plus célèbre derviche du monde musulman. C'est la révélation. Their marriage was fiery and different and, in the end, dissolved by Kimya's death - after which Shams vanished. Rumi's Daughter tells Kimya's story with great charm and tenderness.
